Make sure your home address and postcode are correct, especially if you have made an online application for your children before.

Online Safety Bulletin

Roblox is a very popular game amongst young people and there are important factors all parents/carers should understand and consider. Roblox is a gaming platform where players can create and publish their own games. Roblox allows players to build and publish their own games. This means that other users could build games that contain adult or inappropriate themes that your child might see. Players can use the communication features of Roblox to talk to one other while they are playing. This means that there is a risk of cyberbullying or unwanted contact.

Five tips to help keep your child safe on Roblox.

Sign up with the correct age.

Make sure your child creates an account using the correct age. On Roblox, certain safety settings and parental controls are enabled by default for children under 13. However, you should still review the settings to ensure they've been set up correctly.

Build a list of age-appropriate games.

Not all games on Roblox will be appropriate for your child. The platform has a setting that lets parents and carers limit what their child can play by allowing them to build lists of age-appropriate games. You can also switch off in-app spending or set them monthly limits.

Explore communication settings.

You can manage who your child can speak to by disabling chat completely or limiting it to friends only. You can also switch off their inbox to stop them receiving direct messages.

Explore the platform together.

Ask your child to give you a demonstration of the platform to help you understand how they use it and explore some of the parental controls together. You could even consider setting up your own account and playing the games yourself.

Have regular conversations about gaming.

Continue to have regular conversations with them about what they are doing online. Ask your child open questions like 'What games have you been playing on Roblox recently?' or 'What platforms have you been using to play games?'.

Rights Respecting - Article of the Week

Black History





Article 2 (non-discrimination)

The Convention applies to every child without discrimination, whatever their ethnicity, gender, religion, language, abilities or any other status, whatever they think or say, whatever their family background.

Article 30 (children from minority or indigenous groups)

Every child has the right to learn and use the language, customs and religion of their family, whether or not these are shared by the majority of the people in the country where they live.

Black History Month takes place in October every year and is a celebration of key figures and events in Black history. Having begun in the USA, it has been celebrated in the UK since 1987, with the emphasis on celebrating particularly the history and contributions to society of people with an African or Caribbean heritage.

There is a different theme every year, for example in 2021 the theme 'Proud to Be', aimed to recognise the achievements and contributions that Black people make to the UK every day. The 2022 theme, Time for Change: Action Not Words highlights the importance of being an ally and coming together around shared common goals to achieve a better world for everyone.

Why do you think celebrating Black History is important?

To recognise the contribution and achievements of those with African and Caribbean heritage throughout history.

To ensure that we hear a diverse range of stories when considering the past.

To celebrate people's heritage and cultures.

Because all communities, including schools, should encourage respect for everyone and celebrate diversity and inclusion.

To think about how we can make the world a more equal place where everyone's rights are respected.

To learn how to challenge negative stereotypes.

To ensure that there is time and space for people to discuss more recent events and issues such as Black Lives Matter, the treatment of the Windrush generation and the death of George Floyd.

Because no one should be treated differently because of who they are.

To learn about racism and its effects.

To support people to recognise and challenge discrimination.

Enjoy story time by choosing some books to share by some new Black British authors such as My Hair by Hannah Lee which was nominated for the 2020 BookTrust Storytime Prize.
